## Massachusetts EMS Region III Point-of-Entry Plan STROKE

Patients meeting the **Stroke Alert Criteria** as defined by the most current MA Statewide Treatment Protocol for **Stroke 2.18** will be transported to the closest Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MDPH) designated Primary Stroke Service (PSS) hospital or a recognized out-of-state hospital.

- If any one of the signs of the stroke scale found in the most current MA Statewide Treatment Protocol for Stroke 2.18 is abnormal and onset of symptoms is less than **5 hours**, notify the receiving hospital as early as possible of a "Stroke Alert"; say "Stroke Alert" before beginning entry notification.
- If the onset of signs and symptoms of stroke PLUS transport time is less than **5 hours** transport patient to the closet MDPH designated PSS hospital or recognized out-of-state hospital.
- If patient has depressed level of consciousness, compromised airway control, known hypoglycemia, suspected severe hypoglycemia (diaphoretic and a known diabetic), or is hemodynamically unstable it may be more appropriate to transfer to nearest receiving hospital for acute stabilization.
- If CT Scan capability is unavailable at the closest PSS the patient should be transported to the next nearest PSS.
